

**Christopher Pissarides**

Professor at the London School of Economics and Co-Chair of the Institute for the Future of Work in London. His research has mainly focused on macroeconomics, specifically on search and matching costs in labour markets that give rise to unemployment persistence and to the impact of new technologies on the future of work and well-being. In 2010, together with Peter A Diamond of MIT and Dale T Mortensen of Northwestern University, he was awarded the Nobel Prize in Economics for his work on markets with search frictions. His research on the interactions between the labour market and the macroeconomy considering matching frictions and disruptions from new technologies has made major contributions both to academic research and labour-market policy.
